Parent's Message

You may have heard your child say from time to time. "I can do it by myself!" While there are many things that your child may be capable of doing on his own, he needs to be reminded that is one thing he

can never do by himself: he cannot save himself. Beware of falling into the trap of giving your child the impression that if he is good, he will go to heaven. No one is or can be good enough to earn his own salvation. Point out that we receive the free gift of salvation only through Jesus, who paid for our sins by giving up his own life for us.

You can read the story of the Flood in your Bible at home. Look in Genesis 6:1 - 9:17.
